The Spalding County Board of Commissioners held its Extraordinary Session in Room 108 in the Courthouse Annex, Monday, August 17, 2009, beginning at 6:00 o'clock p.m. with Commission Chairman Edward Goss, Jr. presiding and Commissioners Gwen Flowers-Taylor, Eddie L. Freeman, Bob Gilreath and David Phillips present. Also present were County Manager William P. Wilson, Jr., Assistant to the County Manager Paul Van Haute, County Attorney James R. Fortune, Jr. and Executive Secretary Teresa Watson.

**IV. PRESENTATIONS/PROCLAMATIONS/RECOGNITION**

1. Cherry Hovatter, County Extension Agent, 4-H Youth Development, will recognize Spalding County 4-H State winners for various teams, as well as honors received by the Horse Project participants in the National Super Ride VII Ride of Champions in Texas, and the Horse Quiz Bowl Team.

Ms. Hovatter read the names and awards for participants. Pictures were taken and participants were presented with Spalding County lapel pins.

2. Consider Proclamation declaring September 17 through 23, 2009 to be Constitution Week.

Chairman Goss read the Proclamation and Ms. Annette Mouchet accepted on behalf of the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

**Proclamation**  
Declaring Constitution Week 2009

WHEREAS, We the People, in order to form a more perfect Union, did ordain and establish a Constitution for the United States of America to secure the blessings of liberty for ourselves and our posterity; we further recognize that it is important that all citizens fully understand the provisions, principles, and meaning of the Constitution so they can support, preserve, and defend it against encroachment; and

WHEREAS, We must always remember those who risked and sacrificed their lives to protect our freedoms and honor those who stand ready to take action every day to defend our nation, both here and abroad; and

WHEREAS, September 17, 2009 marks the two hundred and twenty-second anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention on September 17, 1787 and provides an historic opportunity for Americans to learn about and reflect upon the rights and privileges of citizenship and its responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, Public Law 915 guarantees issuance of a proclamation each year by the President of the United States of America designating September 17 through 23 as Constitution Week to commemorate framing of the Constitution of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, The people of Spalding County, Georgia do enjoy the blessings of liberty, the guarantees of the Bill of Rights, equal protection of the law under the Constitution, and the freedoms derived from it, so it is fitting and proper to officially recognize the patriotic celebrations which will commemorate the occasion.

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Spalding County Board of Commissioners, do hereby join our state and nation to proclaim the week of September 17 through 23 as Constitution Week. We invite every citizen and institution to join in commemorating and reaffirming the ideals of the framers of the Constitution by vigilantly protecting the freedoms guaranteed to us through this guardian of our liberties, remembering that lost rights may never be regained.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, be it now resolved that we, the Spalding County Board of Commissioners, do hereby declare that a copy of this proclamation be spread upon the minutes of the proceedings of this Board, reflecting that the week of September seventeenth through twenty-third, in the year of our Lord two thousand and nine, shall be Constitution Week.

Michelle Cannon, 106 Surrey Lane, Griffin, Georgia

Ms. Cannon shared some thoughts and comments regarding leadership, timing and destiny. She presented these same thoughts with the City of Griffin Board of Commissioners at their last meeting. She detailed how she came to move to Griffin, begin a family and establish a business. Ms. Cannon noted her recent disillusionment with politics in general, and she suggested such behavior was very detrimental to the community. She noted several issues that seemed to provide some reason to feel encouraged, i.e. UGA, Griffin Technical College, Sun City, and other City and County improvements, but the negativity between the two primary political factions, the City and County, were extremely frustrating and disappointing. She discouraged stirring the pot of controversy, instead promoting collaboration and sincere community service. This is no time or

place for personal vendettas or animosity with so much at stake and so much to do. Businesses will cease to show interest in the light of such division among political entities. Ms. Cannon suggested that commissioners lead with calm reassuring resolve and not engage in petty vindictiveness as we follow our dreams, taking the high road instead of engaging in divisive tactics.

Tom Queen, Georgia Department of Transportation, District Three, Thomaston, Georgia  
Mr. Queen was present to detail the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) for Spalding County projects. He provided an overview of the SR16 at Hollonville Road turn lanes, SR362 at Rover-Williamson Roads intersection improvement, proposed steel beam repair at seven bridge locations statewide, and from SR16 to west of Green Valley Road for resurfacing and maintenance, as well as the engineering design and planning on Airport Road at the Griffin-Spalding County Airport.

Mr. Queen noted that Mark Sanford was the new area engineer for Griffin and has been in that position for about a month now. Some questions and discussion followed.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of Spalding County, Georgia, as the governing authority of said County, as follows:

Section 1. That the Code of Spalding County, Georgia, be amended in Part VII, Chapter 1, Section 7-1001, relating to speed limits of thirty miles per hour in certain urban or residence districts, by removing sub-sections as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of Spalding County, Georgia, as the governing authority of said County, as follows:

Section 1. That the Code of Spalding County, Georgia, be amended in Part VII, Chapter 1, Section 7-1003, School Zones and Speed Limits Therein, by adding sub-section as follows:

- (k) *Rehoboth Road*, from a point beginning .2 miles east of the South McDonough Road intersection to a point .2 miles west of the South McDonough Road intersection, then on South McDonough Road from a point beginning .2 miles north of the Rehoboth Road intersection to a point .2 miles south of the Rehoboth Road intersection, to be zoned for twenty-five (25) miles per hour with appropriate signs reading school zone, school days only from 7:00 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and from 2:45 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Signs shall be installed on Rehoboth Road and on South McDonough Road, as well, indicating school buses entering roadway.

Section 3. That the within ordinance shall be and become effective immediately upon its adoption on two presentations, as provided by Section 2-1005 of the Code of Spalding County, Georgia, and upon erection of speed limit signs and other signs as designated herein.

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

FOUR-WAY STOP  
ORDINANCE NO. 2009-10

TO AMEND THE CODE OF SPALDING COUNTY, GEORGIA, TO PROVIDE FOR FOUR-WAY STOP INTERSECTION ON CERTAIN COUNTY ROADS; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Spalding County, Georgia, as the governing authority of said County, as follows:

Section 1. That the Code of Spalding County, Georgia, be amended in Part VII, Chapter 1, Section 7-1007, Traffic Control Devices, paragraph (A) Four-Way Stop Intersection Designation, by adding subparagraph (24) as follows:

- “(24) Macon Road at County Line Road.  
(25) South 6<sup>th</sup> Street at County Line Road.”

Section 2. The within ordinance shall be and become effective immediately upon its adoption by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board of Commissioners of Spalding County, Georgia present at two meetings, as provided in Section 2-1005 of the Code of Spalding County, Georgia; and, upon the erection of signs as required herein by the public works forces of Spalding County, Georgia.

Section 3. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

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***Motion to approve Ordinance #2009-10, by Commissioner Phillips, seconded by Commissioner Freeman, carried by a vote of 4-1, with Commissioner Gilreath opposing.***

Mr. Wilson asked for clarification on when to erect the signs with appropriate coverings, which has always been at first reading, so that people can become accustomed to the signs before implementation on second readings. Commissioners Goss, Freeman, Phillips and Flowers-Taylor felt it was appropriate to continue with the long-standing practice of erecting the signs on first reading so that motorists could be made aware of the anticipated traffic control device. Commissioner Gilreath questioned Officer David Gibson, who was present to speak on behalf of the Sheriff's Department since Major Wendell Beam was detained on the firing range where he was instructing this date. Commissioner Gilreath noted the traffic count at these intersections were contradictory to the installation of stop signs on the more heavily traveled County Line Road and disputed the use of a four-way stop as a means of speed control. New stop signs are priced at \$1700 for the state-of-the-art digital signs that will be delivered this week noted Mr. Wilson, and these lighted signs will be of a portable nature so they can be utilized elsewhere after an appropriate period of time.

Commissioner Freeman noted Major Beam was immensely qualified to make these type decisions and had done so for a great many years.

## **XI. NEW BUSINESS**

1. Consider request of Church on Fire for an outside amplification permit for Saturday, November 7, 2009 from Noon until 3:00 p.m. at the corner of Seago Drive and Bleachery Street for outreach ministry.

***Motion to approve, by Commissioner Phillips, seconded by Commissioner Freeman, carried by a vote of 5-0.***

2. Consider approval of new 2009 Alcoholic Beverage License – Retail Sales – Beer and Wine – for Chetan J. Patel, owner of Ravi Mudhry, Inc., d/b/a Expressway Food Mart located at 2903 North Expressway, Griffin, Georgia.

County Attorney James Fortune noted the attorney for the applicant, Mr. Patel, was present, and he introduced Mr. Edward Bullard. He provided an overview of the establishment which had an alcohol license prior to a local church, Church on Fire. However, the license lapsed on December 31, 2007 with the last owners prior to Mr. Patel. That owner was involved in a bankruptcy. Spalding County ordinances clearly state no alcohol license can be issued when there exists a church within 600 feet. He was not arguing whether or not the license would be a

good idea, or even whether or not they can agree to the church's admitted acceptance of the new alcohol license, but rather he advised such action would be concretely in violation of the existing ordinance. The establishment is about 150 feet from the church. Mr. Fortune advised the only recourse to allow issuance of the license, in his view, was to amend the ordinance, but he advised great deliberation and caution as that would affect all future applicants, as well. Mr. Fortune could not, in good conscience, advise this Board to ignore its own ordinance. According to Mr. Fortune, Mr. Bullard argues that bankruptcy would act to toll the licensing issue, but Mr. Fortune noted alcohol licensing was a privilege and not a right. This is not a renewal but rather a new license, which clearly does not meet the measure of the ordinance.

Mr. Bullard provided an anti-litem notice to protect his right to sue in light of an adverse action on this issue. He provided a brief synopsis and did not feel it would open the floodgates for a litany of such requests because of a favorable decision. He read from the minutes of the meeting whereby the church was allowed to move within 600 feet of the establishment selling alcohol. The Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms has no opinion on the matter and defers to the county. The current pastor, Keith Ford, stated today they welcomed the opportunity for outreach ministries, such as their item on tonight's agenda for the outside amplification permit granted earlier. Mr. Bullard contended the vote previously by the County was in degradation of the ordinance. He felt this matter came down to the legal issue of standing. Three different entities (close to residence, close to school, which are moot issues, and the third is for the church which has waived their objection) were cited, and he concurred with Mr. Galloway who stated in 1995 that the object was to protect the church from the sale of alcohol and not the other way around, and the church clearly does not desire such protection. In bankruptcy proceedings, there can be: 1) Relief provided by the bankruptcy court, 2) a trustee can dispose of assets, or 3) when no longer protected, the clock starts ticking again. He did not feel the bankruptcy was a mitigating factor but rather the church as a standing third party in the ordinance was, and they desire to waive their objection.

***Motion/second to approve, by Commissioners Phillips and Freeman, failed by a vote of 1-4 with Commissioners Freeman, Flowers-Taylor, Gilreath and Goss voting in opposition.***

***Motion to deny, by Commissioner Freeman, seconded by Commissioner Gilreath, carried by a vote of 4-1 with Commissioner Phillips opposing.***

3. Consider, on first reading, Ordinance #2009-14 to provide for revised times allowed for alcohol sales for consumption on premises.

***Motion to approve, by Commissioner Phillips, seconded by Commissioner Freeman, carried by a vote of 4-1 with Commissioner Gilreath opposing.***

4. Consider Subgrant Agreement with Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC) for a Spalding County Multi-Use Study to determine feasibility of a Rail-with-Trail Facility Master Plan for a seven-mile span beginning at Johnson Road and extending to Bleachery Street near the UGA Griffin Campus.

Mr. Wilson advised ARC has approved this study, and the County is in the process of developing a Request for Proposal. Anthony Dukes said this is a line that would serve as a means into the northeast quadrant of the County, connecting to the UGA area with rails-to-trails. This area does include Roosevelt Railroad, but will encompass other methods of potential transit, as well. This is merely a starting point for multi-use transportation modes.

***Motion to approve, by Commissioner Freeman, seconded by Commissioner Flowers-Taylor, carried by a vote of 5-0.***

5. Consider, on first reading, an Ordinance amending the FY 2010 Budget Ordinance to provide for year-end encumbrances carried forward.

***Motion/second to approve, by Commissioners Phillips and Freeman, carried 5-0.***

6. Set a Public Hearing date to establish street lighting district for Sun City Peachtree – Pod 39.

***Consensus was to set a date of September 21, per the recommendation of Mr. Wilson.***

7. Consider cancellation of the September 7, 2009 Regular Monthly Meeting due to observance of the Labor Day holiday.

***Motion to cancel the September 7, 2009 Regular Monthly Meeting, by Commissioner Phillips, seconded by Commissioner Freeman, carried 5-0.***

## **XII. REPORT OF COUNTY MANAGER**

- **Reminder:** Per the request of Commissioner Gilreath at last meeting, Mr. Wilson has met with Mr. Macke and Mr. Smith and everyone is fully aware of the necessity for fencing to complete within 30 days. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Fortune will monitor closely.
- **Gateway Grant** – Commissioner Gilreath sent information on this GDOT grant for highway beautification. There is a maximum of \$50,000 for landscaping projects, but worrisome is the requirement that perpetual maintenance be provided by the County.
- **Indonesian guests** – Parks and Recreation, as well as a couple of other departments, have entertained them today.
- **Leadership Collaborative** – September 14 was chosen for a joint meeting with the Board of Commissioners, the City Board of Commissioners and the Board of Education on this issue.
- **Flags at Camp Stephens** – There will soon be a special ceremony for the raising of the flags.
- **UGA Student Center Dedication Service** will be held August 26 at 10 a.m.
- **Outside Amplification Permit** – Brought into the office today was a request for a birthday party for a resident at 145 Henry Burch Drive for a time period to end at midnight. Residents have agreed and signed the request. Commissioners provided consensus for the party but only until 9 p.m. per the County's ordinance.
- **West Griffin Activity Center LCI Meeting** – Another meeting will be held Sat., August 22 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the UGA Stuckey Auditorium as a vehicle for public input.

### **XIII. REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS**

**Freeman** - He asked what routes the Gateway Grant would entail and was informed that was not definite. The County has had beautification projects previously but with personnel reduction and uncertain economic issues, he felt perpetual care might be difficult and he'd be hesitant to agree.

**Flowers-Taylor** - No comments.

**Phillips** - No comments.

**Gilreath** - Commissioner Gilreath felt this County should be a perpetual County and such beautification projects would help. Trips by commissioners who travel often should be approved by this Board and a report should be provided on their return. He asked that consideration of this as a policy be put on the next agenda. He also felt the four-way, solar powered stop signs, at \$1700 each, should come out of the Sheriff's Department budget since they recommended this action and further did not provide this Board with complete information. Major Beam, while probably a fine gentleman, did not do his homework so that commissioners could make a reasonable decision.

**Phillips** - He thought he be able to fabricate the solar-powered, digital stop signs after getting these initial ones and inspecting them carefully. These are also portable, it was noted, and can be moved from location to location as needed rather than being considered just for this one intersection.

**Goss** - In April or May it was discussed with Parks and Recreation about times to keep the gymnasiums open. They have not forwarded minutes yet from last Thursday's Advisory Commission meeting but Commissioner Flowers-Taylor said the recommendation will be to close for one day a week, on Wednesday, after reviewing attendance numbers.
